#### SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENT

**Daria Okul** was the recipient of our Kerry Serl Tribute Scholarship for the 2023-24 academic year. During this past year, Daria has moved from Washington to Arizona and is attending Arizona State University where she is working on a degree in criminal justice. As a student at Toledo High School, Daria graduated as the salutatorian of her class. She also attended Centralia College as a Running Start student and received her AA degree at the same time as her high school diploma. Daria was born in Ukraine and came to the United States with her mother. The rest of her family continues to live in Ukraine, so her mother's support means a lot to her. During her first semester at Arizona State, Daria struggled emotionally without her mother, or any other support network. In fact, being away from her mother has been harder on her than she anticipated, as she is Daria's "greatest cheerleader and constant support." Acclimating to Arizona's climate has taken some time, but she really appreciates the dry, sunny days and warm temperatures. Daria is in her second semester of college and reports that "motivation is a very important thing to have in life!"

#### **BOOK SALE REPORT**

Our 2024 sale was a record-breaking one: in the quantity of books (about 16,000 and over 900 boxes), the number of volunteer hours required to organize it (about 550), and fortunately also in the income! We grossed about \$20,000. While we were left with more books this year than last year, we did sell 90% of what we moved to the Moose Lodge. Thanks to everyone who assisted in any way, but especially to the core group who returned day after day, week after week, to organize the books that flowed into St. John's Lutheran Church where we were collecting, sorting them, and moving those books of less quality to other locations. We incurred \$1000 in expenses for the church, the Moose and the Scouts, and \$175 in credit card fees, but nearly \$19,000 will carry us through the next year and possibly beyond.

About the Book: A discarded painting in a junk pile, a skeleton in an attic, and the greatest racehorse in American history: from these strands, a Pulitzer Prize winner braids a sweeping story of spirit, obsession, and injustice across American history. Kentucky, 1850. Jarrett, an enslaved groom, and a bay foal forge a bond of understanding that will carry the horse to record-setting victories across the South. As the nation erupts in civil war, an itinerant young artist who has made his name painting the racehorse takes up arms for the Union. This novel is not just about a horse and its groom. It is also about art, history, sleuthing, and a great story spanning many generations.

# What We Are Reading

Donna Loucks is recommending **Iona Whishaw**, who wrote a mystery series of 10 books set in the Kootenay Lake area of British Columbia and featuring Lane Winslow, a young woman who did intelligence work in World War II and now just wants to escape Britain and start a new life. But of course, she is immediately embroiled in a series of mysterious deaths and against her firm intentions, falls in love with the local detective.

Jan Leth: Three really good books which I have read recently are: *Oath and Honor* by Liz Cheney. Cheney has put together a very chilling and accurate narrative of the January 6 insurrection and the attempted destruction of the White House and its aftermath leading to the Congressional Committee hearings. A very good fiction book is *The Women* by Kristin Hannah. This book is a depiction of Army nurses during the Viet Nam war and the aftermath of them having PTSD and being forgotten as very important service members in our military. If you are looking for another good nonfiction book I would recommend *Watergate Girl* by Jill Winehouse. Winehouse was the ONLY woman on the legal team which prosecuted the Whitehouse Plumbers during Nixon's presidency. The findings led to Nixon's ultimate resignation.

Barb Selis shares her thoughts on the following: My very favorite book today is *American Prometheus: The Triumph and Tragedy of J. Robert Oppenheimer* by Kai Bird and Martin Sherwin. 25 years of research we learn about Oppie as the Dutch called him. He mastered Latin and Greek by age 9 and later Sanskrit and Dutch and was asked to join the New York Mineralogical Society at age 12 thinking he was an adult by his writings. He loved minerals, writing and poetry and writing poetry. His early education was at the Ethical Cultural School where they taught deed not creed. He loved New Mexico where he and his brother could ride horseback and camp under the stars. At Los Alamos he and his wife gave a party to come dressed as suppressed desire. He even winked at Senator McCarthy. As Newsweek said, "His life does not influence us. It haunts us".

**Book Sale**: Sunday, March 17, will be the big moving day. A Boy Scout troop will be helping with the transport. Members who have trailers or covered vehicles are wanted. At 2 pm, the Scouts will arrive with the books. Members are needed to direct the Scouts with the distribution of boxes of books. Tables will be set up and subject areas will be determined. On Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of that week the books will be set out and organized by subject areas. There has been excellent publicity for the event.

Lewis County Branch AAUW - Business/Board Meeting - March 27, 2024

President Laura Hewett opened the meeting, which was held via Zoom. Approximately 15-17 members were in attendance.

**Minutes of the Previous Meeting**: The minutes of the previous Business/Board meeting were approved as digitally transmitted.

**Treasury:** Treasurer Donna Loucks presented an overview of the current budget. Cathy Cavness questioned the overage of the STEM contribution. Donna explained that The Chehalis Foundation had requested an additional \$1,000 in scholarship for this coming summer. We will hold off with the additional funding until we hear about GeoGirls. Renae Seegmiller asked about the Endowment Fund amount. Nancy Leventon asked about how much was in the investment account within the Endowment Fund.

**Book Sale:** Sale Chair Donna Loucks reported that the sale had grossed about \$20,000, the highest amount ever. Credit card fees came to \$175. There are \$1,000 in expenses (Boy Scouts, fee to the Lutheran Church for accumulation and sorting of books, fee to The Moose for the rental of the space for a week). Renae estimated that 95% of the books sold. Thirty-eight members contributed their time and energy on the sale. Renae reported

that she is stepping down from the three-person chair. Donna said that several members have indicated that they would be willing to take leadership roles next year. Kathy Halsan stated that the book sale is a big service for Lewis County. Jan Leth proposed raising the prices on the books and other items. Donna said that decision would be deferred to the core participant meeting that is going to be held in the future. She is going to suggest that core members take on an in-charge role in the future. It was agreed that it was great to have some of our newest members take an active role in the book sale this year.

**Evening with the Authors:** Chair Jo Martens gave a review of the sub-committees. She said that design services for the posters and tickets was still needed. 100% of the proceeds are going to Hope Alliance. Ticket sales methods were reviewed.

# **Committee Reports**

**Technology:** Jo Martens said that she had tested our new computer with the wifi at The Gathering Place, and it was working fine. There were serious problems with connecting to the wifi at the last program meeting.

**Directory Survey:** Renae and Jeanne Nygard had met to discuss issues of directory content and methods of collecting that information. Part of the survey coming soon to all members will be to ask what members would like to do within the organization.

**Possible New Venue**: Donna said that she had a conversation with Diane Williams, one of the owners of Stillwaters. Mrs. Williams was unaware of the issues of possible conflict with our rental of the space for our meetings. Twelve of our members live at Stillwaters. It has been suggested to offer to pay more in rental each month.

**Membership:** Cathy Cavness and Kathy Halsan reported that we have 96 members currently, with 4 more individuals expressing serious interest in joining. One person desires to be our 100<sup>th</sup> member. The two chairs had attended a meeting with the Olympia AAUW branch. That branch meeting was on the topic of Freedom to Read with a librarian from Olympia taking about censorship issues. Olympia is putting together a meeting with AAUW branches within the five-county Timberland system in the future. The membership team is planning another New Member gathering at British Bites in Centralia.

**Nominating Committee**: A committee will be formed to research possible replacements for the positions of Secretary and Program Chair. Job descriptions should be reviewed by the committee and personal contacts should be made with possible contenders for these positions. Jeanne Nygard was asked to chair that nominating committee.

**Movers and Shakers:** Kathy Halsan and Cathy Cavness reported on the Equal Pay Day that was held at Centralia College. They deemed it a success with great interest in the trivia question wheel and the candy bar distribution. They said that they would be disseminating information on public policy, bills and initiatives on the November ballot. They will be at a table at Centralia College on Earth Day, which is April 22.

**Expanding Your Horizons**: Corene Jones-Litteer said that EYH will not have access to Corbet Theater for the event. Another space in the TransAlta Commons will be utilized. The Foyer to the TAC would be used for registration. Sonja "Swede" Svenson will be the co-chair along with Corene. A chair for student snacks is needed.
