Gathering of Finches by Jane Kirkpatrick: Corene Jones-Litteer wrote this about the book: It was a delightful book that I call fictional history since the events she included actually happened. It's the story of the Simpson empire's growth in the North Bend, Oregon area and the development of Shore Acres. I wanted to read it since I visited the Shore Acres State Park many times while I lived in the Empire District of Coos Bay in the mid-70s. It's not a new title so TRL doesn't have it.

Sharon Lyons has the following books that she has read and enjoyed: *Cloud Cuckoo Land* is an interesting read. Hard to get into, but Anthony Doerr's writing is worth it. He has a unique approach to five stories at once. *Remarkably Bright Creatures* by Shelby Van Pelt is a fun read. If you enjoyed 6:30 in *Lessons in Chemistry*, you will like the animal character here, too.

Nancy has been reading *The Wager* by David Grann. This non-fiction author has taken up the 1742 South American shipwreck of HMS The Wager. It was amazing to me that the author found so much historical information and to write the sea saga into a riveting and engrossing tale of "Shipwreck, Mutiny and Murder." A great read for sure.

The Lewis County Branch Business/Board meeting met via Zoom on Wednesday, February 21. Approximately 17 members met.

President Laura Hewett opened the meeting by welcoming members, including one of our newest members, Kelly Stanley.

Minutes: The minutes of the previous meetings were approved as digitally distributed.

Treasury: Treasurer Donna Loucks reported a treasury balance of \$16,956.82 which includes savings, checking and reserved funds. She reported that a check for \$8500 had been sent to Hope Alliance, as previously approved.

Book Sale: The sale will be in March. Book collection and sorting will be done on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Contributions keep coming in. There is plenty to do and helpers are needed.

Evening with the Authors Committee: Discussion was centered on the type of a flyer to have ready for the book sale distribution. Detailed information will be coming. It was announced that Marilynn Chintella had resigned

the co-chair position with Jo Martens. A moderator for the evening has been determined. An additional author, Garth Stein, will be at the event. There will be discussion with the Centralia College Foundation as to whether we can join with them for the license to sell wine.

Hybrid Meetings Technology: Jo Martens reported on some difficulty with the technology at the Ravenous Readers meeting. The HDMI cable did not carry the sound to the video device.

Handbooks: Jeanne Nygard reported that the handbooks are done. The group will most likely need more directories to finish out the year as new members keep coming onto the roster. She is investigating on-line directories and handbooks.

Branch Assets and Records: Renae Seegmiller reported that she is unable to head this committee. The position of Historian should be encouraged to take a larger role in this project.

Scholarship: Nancy Kruger said that there are 30 applications scholarships. The committee now has seven members, so that workload will be evenly distributed. There will be a meeting of the committee on March 28th at 10 am, in the meeting room at the Chehalis Timberland Library. Documents will be scanned and sent. It was suggested that candy bars be distributed to those attending. The team will also have a table at Earth Day.

Movers and Shakers: It was recommended that AAUW have a presence at the Timberland Library Board meetings. The Olympia Branch of AAUW has invited our branch to attend their March meeting when a representative from Timberland Regional Library will be present to discuss censorship and book banning.

Travel Group: The Travel Group meeting will be on Tuesday, February 27, via Zoom.

AI Summary of Meetings on Zoom: Jeanne Nygard will look into utilizing AI on Zoom for the record of meetings.

Sharon Lyons/Green Valley Arizona Update: Sharon spoke about the activities of her Green Valley Branch in Arizona.
