Ten restaurants donated food trays, and many others donated gift cards which were added to the baskets. In addition, Sharon arranged for Bateaux Cellars to provide wine for the wine bar, staffed by Noel Sharp and Kelly Stanley as well as a Bateaux employee who served the wine. Natalie Vedder collected not only the baskets donated for the raffle, but also many individual items to be added to baskets or used imaginatively in baskets of her creation. Natalie had a crew of volunteers to help wrap the baskets with cellophane and ribbon and move them from her home to the TransAlta Commons. Our interest groups and individuals donated 26 different baskets and items for the raffle. Donna LaLond created beautiful fall-colored centerpieces for each table, a very nice contrast to the black tablecloths. Amber Buck and her volunteers, Corene Jones-Litteer, Julie Nurse and Cheryl Vance, sold raffle tickets which contributed significantly to the total \$4400. Additional Information About Our Spending

Donna Loucks, Treasurer

<u>CDs:</u> Interest rates on CDs finally rose above what was being paid on Money Market funds, so in June 2023, \$25,000 was put into 2 CDs. CD 40 started with \$10,000 that is set aside as EYH Reserve and Scholarship Reserve and expires in 12 months. CD 41 expires in 6 months and started with \$15,000 of money that we knew wouldn't be needed immediately.

EYH Reserve: The EYH fund is so that we always have enough to host the event, even if the College is unable to fund it at the last minute. Usually our income and expenses come out very close, but in 2022, expenses exceeded income, so \$2000 was removed from this fund and returned to the branch budget, leaving \$4000 (+ interest). This year (2024), the college is no longer able to pay for the buses for EYH, so we are going to have to cover that from the reserve. Therefore \$2000 has been added to the budget for next year on the assumption that this need will continue.

Scholarship Reserve: This was set aside in case we fail to earn enough in a book sale to cover the \$4000 contribution to Women Supporting Women Scholarships that has been promised for each year. It started at \$6000 and now has interest added. Now that the amount of money in the WSWS Endowment Fund has increased, it may be that this is no longer needed. However no change is proposed in this budget.

Dues Support


At a previous business meeting, we discussed creating a fund that could be used to pay dues for members who find them a hardship. We have received a discount on new members who joined recently, and rather than refund it to them, I have transferred it to an account which was open but not in use. If existing or potential new members want to use it in the future, they should contact the Membership Chairs. If other members want to contribute to it, contact Donna Loucks, Treasurer.

Contributions

Last year we gave \$2000 to the WF West STEM Camp and \$2000 to Washington State AAUW's Tech Trek instead of our usual \$1000 each. We make a contribution to GeoGirls summer camp only when a girl from Lewis County is selected to participate, which did not occur this past year. I have lumped STEM donations together so that we can make a final decision on exact distribution later. I increased the amount to Women Supporting Women Scholarships from our prior \$4000, and added \$1000 for Immediate Community Needs.

Contributions that don't show in the Budget

Profit from Lunafest and now from Evening with Authors is given directly to Hope Alliance, so does not appear in the budget. Also, we gave them a donation from funds that had accumulated over the past several years. So in 2023-2024, we gave (or will soon give them): \$2275 from 2023 Lunafest, \$8500 from budgeted funds and \$4400 from Evening with Authors, **totaling \$15,175**.

Bits n' Pieces

Conservancy Workshop

Contributed by Kathy Tennyson

Join an online workshop October 10, 2024, 1-3 p.m., and learn about the "Ellsworth Experiment". Ellsworth Creek is a small stream at the south end of Willapa Bay known for its high densities of chum salmon and nestled within the Ellsworth Creek Preserve, which is owned and managed by The Nature Conservancy (TNC). In 2008, TNC initiated a watershed-scale experiment on forest management and watershed health with the goal of restoring ecological characteristics of late-successional forest landscapes from the current state as a relatively young, dense forest. Long-term monitoring of forest, fish, and wildlife have tracked responses to forest management treatments over time.

This 2-hour online workshop will include presentations from Dr. Michael Case (Forest Ecologist, TNC) and Dr. Michael Buonanduci (Postdoctoral Researcher, TNC) and a discussion facilitated by Dr. Mara Zimmerman (Executive Director, Coast Salmon Partnership) to answer the questions: Can forestry management increase the resilience of salmon populations to climate change? How have watershed-scale forest management, estuary restoration, and ocean conditions affected the dynamics of chum salmon populations? There is no cost for participating in the workshop, but registration is requested to help us prepare. Please Register Here or contact Kathy Tennyson for more information.
