Squaxin Island Wood Carver/Artist

Speaker: Andrea Wilber-Sigo

Andrea Wilbur-Sigo is a well-known artist coming from many generations of artists and the first known native woman carver. She is a member of the Squaxin Island Tribe. She grew up surrounded by many types of art forms. She started out with beadwork and has learned many Coastal Salish art forms, including bentwood boxes, welcome figures, house posts, masks, panels, button blankets, twine, twill weaving, and basket weaving. Andrea is continually researching and applying her knowledge to her art forms today. She has received several prestigious awards, and her work can be seen at South Puget Sound Community College, Isthmus Park in Olympia (12 feet welcome figure), Seattle Convention Center, Pioneer Square, Port of Seattle, and Little Creek Casino to name a few of the places. Andrea is an active member of her tribe, volunteering her time and artwork for several community events. She also teaches Coast Salish art classes on a regular basis to children and adults for many of the local tribes. "Every generation has played a big role," Andrea says, "in keeping carving where it is, and making sure it continues." We are honored to have Andrea Wilbur-Sigo present at our AAUW meeting on October 2.


Great Decisions Discussion

Additional Information about our spending

EYH Reserve: We are up in the air about how much EYH will cost us this year and whether we should budget for next year. For many years, we have been holding \$4000 in an EYH Reserve fund just in case there is a crisis, which is what we are having this year. This fund may be spent to pay the additional costs this year, and we don't know whether we will be able to continue holding EYH in the future. This year's budget has been left with a significant amount of "uncommitted" funds until these are settled.

We also have been holding \$6000 in a **Scholarship Reserve.** This was set aside many years ago in case we failed to earn enough in a book sale to cover the \$4000 contribution to Women Supporting Women Scholarships that has been promised for each year. Now that the amount of money in the WSWS Endowment Fund has increased so that they will always be able to give some scholarships, I propose that this be transferred to Women Supporting Women account (in addition to the \$10,000 in this year's budget).

Dues Support: We have created a fund that can be used to pay dues for members who find them a financial hardship. For several years, we have received a discount on new memberships, and rather than refund it to them, I have transferred it to a separate account called Dues Support. If existing or potential new members want to use it in the future, they should contact the Membership Chairs. If other members want to contribute to it, contact Donna Loucks, Treasurer.

Contributions: Last year we gave \$2500 to the WF West STEM Camp and \$2500 to Washington State AAUW's Tech Trek. It has been suggested that we select one or more girls to attend Tech Trek rather than just donating money. The cost for each girl is about \$2000. We also should consider pushing GeoGirls summer camp and see if we can get a girl from Lewis County selected to participate, in which case we will pay for her tuition.

Contributions that don't show in the Budget: Profit from Evening with Authors is given directly to Hope Alliance, so does not appear in the budget. Expenses are deducted from profit and we give away the remainder. We don't have all the online payments and bills yet for the 2025 EWA so don't have the exact number, but there is about \$3500 to donate to them.

Likewise, nothing is budgeted for the book sale because expenses for it are deducted from the profit. All income and expenses are tracked and details can be provided to anyone who is interested.
